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Foreword

This year Together for Short Lives has reached some important milestones in our mission to make sure that every single seriously ill child and their families get the help and care they need.

Together, with the support of the children's palliative care sector, we have secured policy change that will directly improve the lives of these children and families, and we raised over £1,000,000 to pay for the lifeline care they need in children's hospices and palliative care services. Our helpline, advocacy and family support services are reaching and supporting more families than ever. And we have secured funding for new research, so we can identify the most up-to-date number of seriously ill children right across the UK.

We are helping to transform care and support for young people with our new Improving Transitions for Young People Fund, and we've pioneered new ways of supporting families through our volunteer programme, including launching our digital Together We Can volunteer hub. Importantly, we've helped families, young people and our members to shout louder, helping the public to better understand children's palliative care and the vital role it plays in children's lives.


But it's not been a year without challenge, and Together for Short Lives has needed to take some tough decisions to make sure we are fit for the future and in good shape to deliver our new strategy for change. We are living in challenging times, where financial pressures can directly impact families and the dedicated services and professionals that care for them. It's shocking that families facing the heartbreak of knowing their child will die young still struggle to get the right support and face a postcode lottery of care. Spending precious time fighting for their child's care compounds the sense of loneliness shared by many of the families we are here for. We must change this.

And we know that the number of seriously ill babies, children, and young people is growing. Medical advancements and high-quality healthcare mean that more babies are surviving and young people are living longer, but the funding and services supporting them haven't kept pace with the increased demand. These families and the lifeline services that are there for them need our help more than ever. There is much to do to ensure that children, young people and their families are empowered and get the right support and that services are sustainable and co-ordinated.

We cannot address these challenges or change lives without your help. Thank you to everyone who has supported Together for Short Lives – by adding your voice, by sharing your story, by funding our charity, by running, climbing or baking cakes – your help means the world to the families we support. By working together, we can achieve much more. Over the coming year we look forward to working with families, our supporters, members and partners, and all those involved in children's palliative care, to deliver lasting change – so no child or family is ever left behind.





Together we support

From diagnosis or recognition to bereavement, families looking after a seriously ill child or young person must navigate an often uncoordinated and confusing landscape of support. We're here to make that journey smoother, so families can spend more time together.



The Lifeline

Our Together for Families helpline has continued to grow from strength to strength this year, signposting families and professionals to the right support for them and providing a listening ear to families who need to talk. The overall number of calls received by families has increased by 31%, evidence that more families than ever are turning to us for support.

Helping the helpers, so no child or family is left behind



We’ve supported thousands of professionals who deliver lifeline care to children and families, and we’ve developed new tools and innovative learning events to inspire and improve practice.

Over 700 professionals joined our learning events and webinars, and 90,000 people visited our information hub for children’s palliative care professionals. Our new

pathway to improve care for seriously ill babies was downloaded by over 1200 individuals.



Our new series of learning webinars about improving care for young people reached at least 150 people, with 100% of attendees saying they found the sessions enjoyable, and 91% saying they would change their practice as a result.

A helping hand

We know that families value any practical support that gives them time to spend together. That’s why we created Together We Can, with support from True Colours Trust and The Royal Foundation, a complete guide to setting up a family support volunteering service. Trained volunteers can provide practical support to families caring for a seriously ill child. The resource has been downloaded 706 times since its launch, and 88 families have been matched to volunteers.

Fighting your corner

With more families than ever seeking our support, the advocacy service we offer in collaboration with LawWorks, Voices for Families, continues to plug gaps left by changes to the legal aid system. Pro-bono lawyers have worked alongside families to secure the care packages and living arrangements they are entitled to. This year, the scheme was extended to operate in three new settings.

John Roden and his family were supported through our Advocacy Project via Richard House, and were rehoused as a result.

“I had been battling with the local council for years – and we’d got nowhere. Then we found out about Together for Short Lives’ Advocacy drop-in service. They listened to our story and wrote to the council. Almost immediately, I got a call saying they’d found a brilliant new flat for us. On the day we went to visit, I walked through the front door and said “YES” – there was so much space for Hope to explore. It’s made a tremendous difference to us as a family. It’s our palace.”

Hearing the news that your child will have a short life is heartbreaking. It's an incredibly distressing and confusing time, and families often say they feel isolated and lonely. We're passionate about empowering families, children and young people so they don't feel so alone. This year we shared hundreds of stories about children and families and found new ways to support and engage them in our work.

Helping families feel valued

We want children, young people and families to have as fulfilling lives as possible. Through our involvement in the Care Quality Commission's Expert by Experience programme, we've helped parents like Sue put their first-hand experience to good use, informing the work of services and commissioners.

Let's get digital



This year we've focused more than ever on digital support for families, starting with a new mobile-optimised website.

We've also moved our secret family Facebook group from the pilot stage into part of our official family offer. Moderated by parents with experience of caring for a life-limited child, the group provides a safe space for families to share their highs and lows with people "who just get it".



Bringing families together

Together we change

As a national charity, Together for Short Lives is in a unique position to bring about change that benefits the whole children's palliative care sector. We listen to families and initiate change from the ground up: from the very standards that govern the care provided by services, to legal loopholes that prevent families from living life to the full.

Changing lives

At Westminster, we've fought alongside families to close a legal loophole barring children under three from accessing the mobility component of Disability Living Allowance. The change has opened a world of opportunities for families with seriously ill children, who can now access the specialist vehicles they need to travel.

We've also been working behind the scenes by supporting the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Children Who Need Palliative Care. We've helped the group to educate and inform politicians about the value of children's palliative care, motivating them to take action. We've also helped the group to launch its first inquiry, examining the extent to which children and families can make palliative care choices in England. This will report in Autumn 2018.

Teaming up with families and professionals

We've come together with professionals and families to shape important guidance that sets out how children's palliative care should be planned and provided, consulting our members on NICE's new guideline on 'End of Life Care for Infants, Children and Young People' and running a series of focus groups with young people. Our feedback to NICE was informed by parents and professionals and ensured that the standard now reflects the vital role of community nurses and the importance of helping families plan for the future when their child's life-limiting condition is recognised during pregnancy.

Reducing the burden for families

Many families facing their child's death have the added financial burden of paying to bury their child, with costs often amounting to hundreds of pounds. This year, we got behind a call led by Carolyn Harris MP to abolish these fees. As a result of the campaign, the prime minister announced that the government would create a funeral fund, enabling local authorities across England to waive these charges. This followed the Welsh Government's decision to abolish child burial fees in 2017. These much-needed changes will have a huge impact on the families of the 4,000 children who die every year in England and Wales, many of whom are forced to face significant financial costs at such a difficult time.

Together we amplify

We bring families, supporters and everyone caring for seriously ill children together, so we can change hearts and minds and help families get lifeline care and support. By working together, we can make a much bigger difference to children and families.

Children's Hospice Week


Our Children's Hospice Week campaign raised vital funds for children's hospices and helped reassure families that lifeline care is available to them. The week was supported by Her Royal Highness, The Duchess of Cambridge, 18 special celebrity friends and 50 hospices and palliative care services. We put seriously ill children and children's hospices in the spotlight – Children's Hospice Week trended on Twitter for six hours. We reached over 61 million people by sharing powerful stories about children, families and hospices in the media – our social media stories reached over 30 million.

A good death is priceless

When families face the heartbreak of their child’s death, we want to make sure that every child has the end of life care they need, and a good death. This year we’ve been working hard, in partnership with bereaved parents and five national

charities, to end a cruel postcode lottery and help families facing the unimaginable to have the best possible end of life care. We shared our ambitions to help every child have a good death at a special Westminster event called Follow the Child.

Supporting bereaved families

We were part of a 44-strong partnership of charities calling for bereavement support for families grieving the loss of a baby. During Baby Loss Awareness Week, 99 MPs took action to support our collective call and 71 buildings across the UK turned blue and pink to remember babies who have died.


No child or family should ever be left behind

Caring for a child with a life-limiting condition is a 24-hour, seven-day-a-week job, but too many families can’t access the out of hours support they need. Our new research exposed that a third of NHS funding bodies in England do not plan and fund community children’s nurses to give the specialist care seriously ill children need outside of normal working hours. We worked with BBC Radio 5 Live’s team on an exclusive 5 Live Investigates feature, calling for an urgent government review of children’s palliative care – generating a media reach of over 39 million.

Hayley, mum to Holly who has a complex life-limiting condition, shared her story to help us campaign for 24/7 care. When it comes to out-of-hours and weekend care, Hayley is left without any support.

“We don’t have anyone through the night, we don’t really have anyone at the weekend. I’m dealing with life-threatening situations, and if I make the wrong decision that could have a serious impact on Holly. I feel like I’m trying to do a job, but I’m not given the right tools to do the job, and I feel quite isolated and alone and scared sometimes. I’m not a clinician, I’m a mum. To have that support, it’s like when somebody gives you that hug and says, it’s going to be ok.”





Together we can do even more

We're always striving to do more for the families we support by raising vital funds. From creating new resources, to organising legal help and branching out into new forms of social media support; we can't do it alone. We rely on passionate individuals and businesses to spread the word and support our work and that of children's hospices and palliative care services across the UK.



Making magical moments with Disney



In November, Disney UK and Together for Short Lives launched a festive campaign to raise funds and awareness, creating magical memories for children supported by local children's hospices.

The campaign focussed on activities around two new releases – *Olaf's Frozen Adventure* and *Star Wars: The Last Jedi*. Disney leveraged the enormous popularity of the Star Wars franchise and the anticipated new release as a 'force for good', selling official commemorative notes through online marketplace, eBay, to support the charity.

£325,000 was raised across the entire campaign and gifts in kind with a value of over **£36,000** were donated to children's hospices across the UK, allowing them to hold a magical 'Olaf's Frozen Adventure' themed party for the families they support.

The collaboration paved the way for a long-term relationship between the brands, and we are enormously proud to have been named as one of Disney UK's strategic partners.

Teaming up with legal eagles

Since 2012, legal firm Clyde & Co has raised over £360,000 for local children's hospices and supported hundreds of seriously ill children and their families.

One of the most impactful ways Clyde & Co's lawyers have shown their support is through their pro bono work as part of LawWorks and Together for Short Lives' Advocacy Service: Voices for Families. The project matches Clyde & Co lawyers with families caring for a seriously ill child, offering free legal advice to help them deal with complex issues such as housing, benefits and care packages.

More than a marathon

Loz Braiden and his friends set themselves the ultimate physical endurance challenge to support our work with children and families. Loz, Matt and Ben set off from Paris to cycle the 251 miles to Buckingham Palace in under 24 hours. Arriving with only 9 minutes to spare, they got up the next morning to successfully run the London Marathon.
